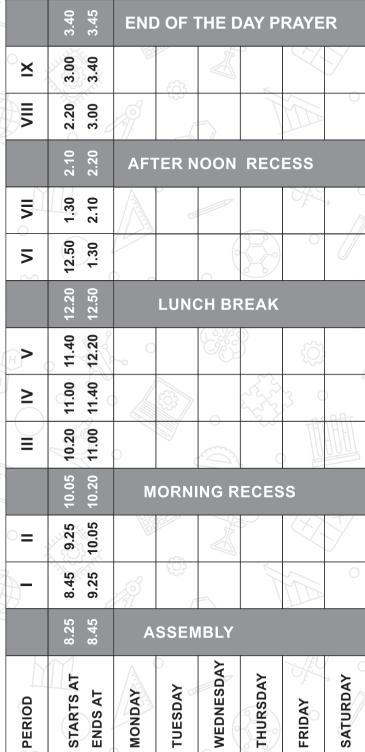

Vision & Mission

PSG PUBLIC SCHOOLS, COIMBATORE, aims to educate its children to have such an understanding that they will give no offence to others, shine fulfilling the highest ideas of which they are capable. They should appreciate the difference between right and wrong, and be familiar with the accepted social and moral codes of behaviour. They have a most hearty contempt for all the sneak - their vices, such as cheating, pilfering, tale bearing and petty revenge, and have made up their minds, that they will be happier telling the truth and suffering than telling lies and going scot-free. They should be prepared to resist the yoke of superstition and custom, to use their own initiative, and to accept discipline, responsibility and leadership. They should outgrow the fear of unpopularity or maintaining independent opinion. They should have increasing opportunities, as they grow older, to take charge, to organize, to act on their own and, in consequence, to make mistakes and learn from them.

They should know that education cannot be divorced from standards of social behaviour. Their good manners should be as reliable in the company of their inferiors as of their superiors and equals. They should feel quite with strangers, both men and women, and be able to take part in an intelligent conversation without shyness or aggression. They should find happiness in good fellowship and friendliness, and while slow to make friends, should be slower still to make enemies. They should have their temper and emotions under control but never be afraid of righteous anger. They should form a stronger resolve to serve their country and their fellow men and women, both in their daily work and some of their spare time. They should have at least an elementary understanding of social, political and economic problems of their own country. They should believe that some work for the welfare of the poor and some share in the duties of the good citizens are obligatory on everyself-respecting men and women.

They should be accustomed to live simply, should see nothing derogatory in dirtying their hands, should enjoy physical effort, adventure and a spice of danger, and pride themselves on being able to look after themselves. They should learn the value of money, and be able to live within their income and be competent to deal with a bill, cheque, money-order or pass-book.

They should have the habit of reading widely for themselves both for information and pleasure and should know how to take notes of their reading and how to extract information from a reference library. They should also be in the habit of reading a daily newspaper, framing their own judgements, distrusting second hand opinions and not taking for gospel everything in print. They should be able to speak and write equally fluent in our national language, in English and mother-tongue. They should learn how to learn and have a desire to go on learning, and be able to do a good deal of solid work without a teacher always at their side.

They should develop artistic talent of any kind which they may possess. But whether they have such a talent or not, they should be trained to appreciate natural beauty, to criticize the art and design of others and form a cultural taste.

They should be able to play games, tolride, swim and run in order to develop the virtues of courage, unselfishness, and good sportsmanship to win coordination between mind and body and to possess healthy form of recreation for their leisure hours. They should know how to win and keep good health and should be sensibly but frankly instructed in all matters of personal and public hygiene.

They should be able to make good use of their leisure and possess resources for their own amusement and pleasure whether alone or in the company of their friends. They should have no cause to feel bored either by themselves or with others if cut off from urban entertainments and comforts. They should have sufficient inexpensive hobbies, as will interest them in every likely situation in which they may find themselves.

Finally, they should have a healthy sense of the richness of the country's past history, the heritage of splendor and greatness into which they have entered, and they should resolve that their lives shall be devoted to her service and do the service to their fellow men and women. And if, when the time comes for them to leave, they can claim to have achieved more than a few of those ideals, they will be able to look back with pride and affection to the years of their schooling, and sent them out with loyalty than the production of such men and women for the services of India and her people.

RULES & REGULATIONS

- 1. Attendance for the morning assembly is compulsory.
- 2. Every student is expected to be courteous in talk and behaviour at all times.
- 3. Students shall bring all the textbooks and notebooks as required by the teachers.
- 4. Students should spruce up their classrooms before leaving.
- 5. Pupils with irregular attendance, major misconduct and disobedience are liable to be questioned.
- 6. Every student of the school must possess the School Diary and it should be brought to the school every day.
- 7. Students are not allowed to tamper or operate any of the electrical fitting.
- 8. Any breakages or damage of school property must be reported immediately to the class teacher and the school office. Charges will be levied depending on the nature of the damage.
- 9. Possession of unsigned literature is punishable.
- 10. School will not accept responsibility of any personal belongings. Any item lost / found needs to be reported to the office.
- 11. Classrooms must be kept neat. Text-books and exercise books must not be defaced in any way. Desks and cupboards must not be defaced and must be kept tidy.
- 12. Bringing Gadgets to school premises is strictly prohibited.

STUDENT BEHAVIOUR

Students are expected to:

- Work to the best of their ability.
- Listen to and follow instructions effectively.
- Be properly equipped for all lessons.
- Arrive at class on time and be ready to start.
- Complete and submit homework on time.
- Bring pens, pencils, ruler and eraser, colour pencils daily.
- Be respectful and considerate to all students, staff members and the visitors.
- Be honest, truthful and trustworthy.
- Respect other people's belongings
- Not to touch, borrow or take others' property, without the owner's permission.
- Respect school property.
- Behave in the best manner when representing the school in public places.
- Enter and leave their classrooms in single formation and in an orderly manner.
- Not to bring any of the following to school; chewing gum, jewellery, mobiles, and other electronic gadgets.
- Use the litter bins available.

NOTE TO PARENTS

- 1. The enrollment of the pupil to the School implies that the parents of the ward have agreed to abide by the Rules and Regulations of the school and those framed from time to time, in the best interest of the school and all its students.
- 2. Parents are requested to co operate with the school authorities by enforcing regularity, punctuality and discipline, by taking an active interest in all aspects of students' school life.
- 3. We also exhort parents to keep in touch with the class teacher, to get updated about the latest developments.
- 4. Parents will not be allowed to meet the teachers or the students during the class hours without prior permission from the Headmistress.
- 5. For any specific information or clarification, we advise you to send a request slip to the concerned teacher seeking an appropriate time to call or meet.
- 6. Parents are also requested to communicate change of address, phone nos. or any information to the Headmistress in writing.
- 7. Drop your child, at least 5 minutes before the first bell and avoid unnecessary rush and the resulting stress on their ward.
- 8. Promptly record the "Leave of absence" in the school diary. Take the best interest to avoid absence from school on all working days.
- 9. Any communication made by the parent/guardian should be addressed to the Headmistress. The details of the student (Name, Class & Section) should be furnished along with the address and the phone number.
- 10. Parents should ensure that their wards learn their daily lessons at home regularly.
- 11.Parent should encourage their wards to attend all the National festival celebrations in the school.

DRESS CODE

- Students should be dressed in the prescribed school uniform or house uniform as required.
- Civil dress is permitted only during excursions and on birthdays.
- Students should dress up neatly; fasten all the shirt buttons except the top button.

ADMISSION & WITHDRAWAL

Students of our school are expected to follow the curriculum prescribed by the Central Board of Secondary Education, New Delhi.

Applications for admission should be made on the prescribed form by parents or guardians who will be responsible to the head of the school for the pupil's conduct, department, punctuality, regular attendance, progress in school and payment of fees, and other matters.

A child must be two years old on 31 December of the school year before he/she can be admitted to Pre K.G. No child who has not completed 5 years will be considered for admission to class I. A corresponding scale of age is fixed for the successive classes.

A pupil who joins the school for the first time must produce a photocopy of the official birth certificate or passport as evidence of the date of birth entered in the admission form. A child coming from another school must produce a transfer certificate from the school that attended, duly countersigned by the education officer or the competent authority of the area.

Application for withdrawal should be submitted in writing to the Headmistress at least one month before the date of withdrawal or a month's fee will be charged in lieu of the notice.

A transfer certificate, or any other certificate, will be issued only if all school dues have been paid and library books and school items taken on loan have been returned.

LEAVE OF ABSENCE

Leave will not normally be granted during term time.

Student should not leave the school premises during the school hours without the written permission of the Headmistress.

Except for duly approved reasons, the extension of vacation is not permitted. Latecomers after vacation, who have not been granted leave of absence, may have their names struck off the rolls.

Application for medical leave should always be accompanied with a medical certificate from a registered medical practitioner.

All leave applications should bear the signature of parents or guardians, who are directly responsible for the child.

If the child avails permission, the child will not be considered for 100% attendance.

EXAMS AND ASSESSMENTS

CONTINUOUS AND COMPREHENSIVE EVALUATION (CCE) refers to a system of school based evaluation of students that covers all aspects of students development.

External examinations are largely inappropriate for the 'knowledge society' of the 21st century and it's need for innovative problem solvers', questions if not framed well, "call for rote memorization fail to test higher-order skills like reasoning and analysis, lateral thinking, creativity and judgement. External exams make no allowance for different types of learners and learning environments and induce an in-ordinate level of anxiety and stress".

(National curriculum framework – position paper on Examination Reforms)

The Central Board of Secondary Education, New Delhi has also perceived these flaws in our educational systems and brought necessary reforms in its curriculum and evaluation through the Continuous and Comprehensive Evaluation (CCE) since end of last year.

In order to improve the teaching learning process, assessment should be both Periodic Assessment and Term Exams.

The "Continuous" aspect of CCE takes care of 'periodicity' aspect of evaluation. Continual means assessment of students in the beginning of instructions (placement evaluation) and assessment during the instructional process (Periodic Assessment) done informally using multiple techniques of evaluation.

Periodicity means assessment of performance done frequently at the end of unit/term (Term Exams). The "Comprehensive" component of CCE takes care of assessment of all round development of the child's personality. It includes assessment in 'Scholastic' as well as 'Co-Scholastic' aspects of the pupil's growth.

Scholastic aspect includes curricular areas or subject specific areas, whereas Co-Scholastic aspects include Life Skills, Co-Curricular, Attitudes and Values.

Promotion from one class to the other is decided on the basis of any grade obtained other than E grade in Scholastic area of both periodic, term exams and satisfactory completion of all assignments projects / worksheets / surprise tests / class tests, etc.

There will be two exams made in a year, Term 1 exam ending in the month of September and Term 2 exam ending in the month of March.

Bimonthly test will be conducted for Grades III - V and the answer scripts will be evaluated and grades will be given.

Students of grades I & II will be assessed on the progress they make in the class and on their performance in the continuous and comprehensive evaluation. Parents will receive their children's progress report twice a year. There will be more reports in higher classes.

Students of grades I to V would normally be promoted to next class unless their attendance of the year has been less than 80 percent and / or their progress during this year in the scholastic areas has not been satisfactory.

The student has to score a minimum of 33% in each subject to be eligible for promotion.

Parents are requested to read through the policy in detail and create desired awareness in their wards so that unnecessary inconvenience at a later stage can be avoided.

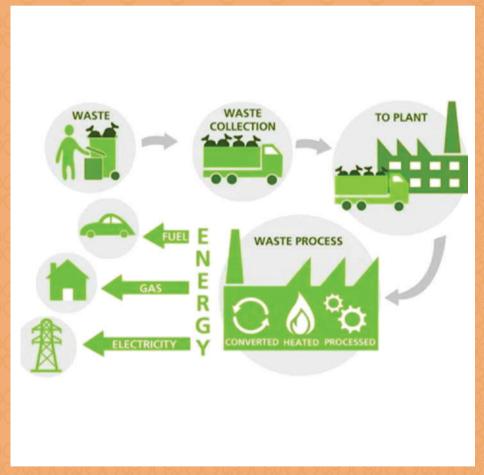

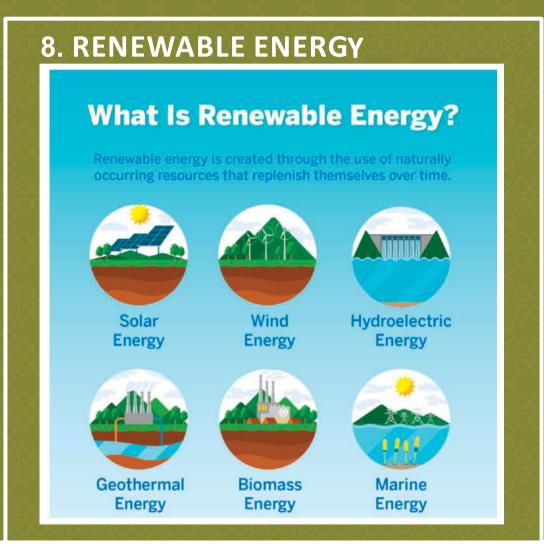
